Elyria police deserve praise for handling of standoff

Police are too often the front line for health crises like suicide. Mental health care, though, is not just for first responders and clinicians. The person most likely to prevent a mental health crisis is a loved one, friend or alert community member. If anyone and everyone learned to identify and respond appropriately to mental health concerns, many crises could be prevented.

As I write this, there are 28 people in our training center at the Lorain County Board of Mental Health, receiving free mental health first aid training, learning skills to help their loved ones before distress becomes crisis. Before a call to police needs to be made.

We also provide specialized crisis intervention training for police officers and emergency responders in how to interact with people who have had trauma in their lives, or who are in an active mental health crisis.

In an Oct. 17 story headlined "Standoff ends quietly," The Chronicle-Telegram reported that the Elyria police responded to a man experiencing suicidal thinking. I applaud that the officers recognized the man's mental health crisis, created a safe, clear space and gave multiple hours to de-escalating the situation. I am grateful to Elyria police and to our many first responders who demonstrate skill and sensitivity when a person is experiencing an active mental health crisis.
