



Implementation Guide for Ohio High Schools

1.0 Introduction

This document is intended to assist school staff in implementing the At-Risk for High School Educators training in individual schools. Your school has chosen to use At-Risk because this training could be a critical link to helping students to graduate, get connected to early treatment of a mental illness, or even avert a suicide.

As a tool of primary prevention and early intervention, At-Risk aims to increase the number of trained staff in the school building and, as a result, enhance the likelihood that a student in distress will be identified. Training staff not only holds promise for improving health and academic outcomes for individual students but improving school climate and enhancing the safety of the overall community.



At-Risk for High School Educators is a free online, interactive gatekeeper training simulation designed to prepare high school teachers and staff to 1) recognize the common indicators of psychological distress and 2) approach an at-risk student to better connect them to appropriate support services. 2.0 Choosing an Implementer

Superintendents and principals are ideal champions of the program because their involvement signals the importance of the program. Often, however, the "point person" for the training will be a counselor, student services director or other staff member who becomes familiar with the "makes it happen." It might also be a parent or a staff member from a community-based health organization that is linked to the school. The implementer will gain familiarity with the course as well as with the outreach tools that are available and easily customized to the needs of the school (See section 6 below). The Implementer for your school should read this document, establish goals for success, and consider the best format and timing for implementing the training.

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3.0 How to Enroll Your School

Access to this program is free for educators, but schools must first register to activate the training for staff. To enroll your school, go to: http://highschool.kognito.com/ohio and click the Enroll School button. Fill out the brief online form and you will be notified when your school is ready to participate. Any staff member can enroll the school, but it's best if administrators are supportive.

4.0 How to Access the Training

Once the school is enrolled, staff can access the training as follows:

- 1. Go to the course page: http://highschool.kognito.com/ohio
- 2. Click the **ACCESS TRAINING** tab in the center of the page.
- 3. Use ENROLLMENT KEY ohio345

Individual users create a personal account that enables each one to take the training (completion takes about an hour) in one or in more than one session. The course registers the users progress, so it will resume at the point it was suspended.

Once users complete the course, they can download and print a certificate of completion and take the post-training survey.

5.0 How to Implement At-Risk in Your School

Unless otherwise directed by state or district regulations, each school leader will select his or her own way of implementing the training. Schools will receive periodic status reports from program administrators that indicate how many staff have taken the course.

While each school is different, and different states and districts have different professional development protocols, here are a few suggestions of implementation approaches that have worked in the past:

Implementers should aim to have staff complete the training within a semester after enrolling in the program. If implementing in either the independent PD or voluntary models, best practice is to give learners a specific window of one-to-several weeks to complete the training.

7.0 Recognition Program for Schools

To recognize and commend the efforts of educators to support youth in distress, schools will receive a certificate of appreciation after reaching any of four levels of staff participation in the At-Risk training.

Level 1: Bronze = 10% of staff trained Level 2: Silver = 50% of staff trained Level 3: Gold = 75% of staff trained Level 4: Platinum = 100% of staff trained
